# Farm Bureau Partners with Local Food Pantry for 2020 Food Checkout Day...please lend a hand!

For the past 19 years, Cook County Farm Bureau® has partnered with Ronald McDonald House Charities® of Chicagoland and Northwest Indiana. Through the generosity of partners Farm Bureau has donated over \$145,000 and nearly 100,000 pounds of food.

During the past 19 years, the House's business model has transitioned, and they no longer rely on the food donations provided by Food Checkout Day. The CCFB Board continues to support RMH in other ways. For the 2020 program, Farm Bureau will partner with Together We Cope, a local food pantry serving 27 south suburban communities in four townships, Breman, Orland, Palos, and Worth. Together We Cope, based in Tinley Park, serves 5,000 people monthly.

As we prepare for a new and hopefully long-term partnership with Together We Cope, we want to ask for your support. # 2020 Foundation Scholarship Applications Being Accepted...Feb 14 deadline

The Cook County Farm Bureau Foundation has opened the 22st Annual "Farm and Food" Agricultural Scholarship Program. The Cook County Farm Bureau Foundation is offering college students the opportunity to start or continue his/her higher education with a scholarship. Last year, the Foundation provided eight scholarships ranging from \$1,000-\$3,000 each.

The Board will name the top applicant as the Howard Paarlberg Excellence in Agriculture Scholarship recipient. The Foundation will award a scholarship (s) to college students pursuing agricultural related fields of study. The Conserv FS FFA Scholarship for \$2,000 will also be offered to individuals in Cook County involved past or present in an approved FFA Program.

The Foundation Board has set the following criteria for the scholarship program:

- Applications must be completed and submitted to the CCFB Foundation by February 14, 2020. Late applications will not be considered. Much of the application can be submitted electronically.
- All applicants must be members or dependents of members in good standing with the Cook County Farm Bureau for at least one year. (With the exception of the Conserv FS FFA Award)
- All applicants must be high school graduates accepted for enrollment by, or currently enrolled at, an accredited college, university, or community college.

# AFBF Selects Cook County Farm Bureau® as a "County Activity of Excellence" Winner for 2020

The American Farm Bureau Federation® (AFBF) has named the Cook County Farm Bureau's "Food Pantry Challenge" a 2020 County Activity of Excellence (CAE)! As a CAE winner, Cook CFB will participate in the Farm Bureau CAE Showcase at the 2020 AFBF Annual Convention and Trade Show in Austin, Texas this month.

AFBF received over 100 entries across all membership categories with 24 activities selected for the Trade Show.

Sponsored by the Public Relations Team, the Food Pantry Challenge, asked urban families to support their local food pantry by voting for them on Facebook. Messages connected urban consumers to local farmers and the healthy and nutritious food they grow and raise.

Final results included \$3,500 donated to 14 Cook County food pantries. The social media campaign featured over 7,000 votes, 400 comments, 1,500 shares, nearly 15,000 engagements and an organic reach of 118,000.

# a tough topic

2019 was a difficult year for farmers and there's no avoiding it.

Illinois Farm Bureau® (IFB) President, Richard Guebert, Jr. said last month in Chicago during his annual Illinois Farm Bureau address, "I do not know about you, but I am ready to be done with 2019 and turn the page to 2020!" He was talking about the never-ending weather issues that plagued farmers this past year, the depressed farm prices for most commodities, the continuing trade wars, escalating input costs and the many related issues facing American agriculture.

All of the 1000 farmer members in attendance at the speech clapped in

I have been working at the Farm Bureau for over 32 years, have been involved in farming all my life and have never seen a frustrating year like 2019 affecting all farmers. It rained all spring and into the summer. Only a portion of crops were planted and grown.

Hay grew uncut. Some of the hay that was cut was rained on, diminishing its quality. Now, I hear there's a hay shortage in the area.

Storm clouds kept customers away from farm stands, greenhouses and other agricultural businesses that depend on direct sales. Customers stayed dry at home, leaving flower beds and gardens unplanted.

To throw salt on the wound, it continued to rain during the fall as farmers attempted harvest (what there was available to harvest).

Trade talks have been mired all season, depressing commodity prices. Finally,

there has been a glimmer of hope on the trade front in recent weeks... a tentative agreement with China. The House of Representatives has opened discussions to consider approval of the United States Mexico Canada Agreement (USMCA). In addition, the recently announced Japanese trade deal grabbed a portion of the benefits that had been promised to farmers as a part of the Trans-Pacific partnership agreement several years ago which President Trump negated.

However, farmers are reluctant to get excited; what if the rug is yanked out from under their farms again?

IFB President Guebert described 2019 as the movie, The Perfect Storm. All the forces of nature and economics have come down hard upon the backs of our Midwestern farmers. This can take a toll on an individual physically, mentally, spiritually, and psychologically.

Knowing that this is been such a difficult year, I wanted to reach out to our members and farm producers that may be feeling down. Please know that there are people available to talk to and provide help.

What would happen if you as a farmer, ignored signs of stress in your crops and livestock? I know that you go out of your way to care for and fix the problem. Please do the same for yourself as well.

I have learned through example and witnessed myself that farmers are resilient. I have learned through example and witnessed myself that farmers are optimists. I have learned through example and witnessed myself that farmers tend to try to work it out, many times alone. Sometimes alone is not the right course.

2020 is a fresh, new year. The sun will shine again. Our fertile earth will provide again. Crops will grow. Livestock will provide so much to us. The consumer and customer will be back in full force seeking great food and local products.

Remember, your family and friends are your most precious commodity. We want all in agriculture to be a part of 2020's rebirth.


## CENTENNIAL LEGACY PATIO TO BE CREATED TO BENEFIT FOUNDATION

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# **Young Leaders Visit Local Classroom**

# Recipe of the Month: Cream of Cauliflower or Broccoli Soup

Zeldenrust Farm Market, Chicago Heights 10 chicken bouillon cubes

cups water ribs of celery (cut up)

teaspoon salt

½ teaspoon garlic powder

1 stick butter 8 tablespoon flour 1 cup onion (cut up) teaspoon pepper 8 cups fresh cauliflower/

broccoli (cut up)

2 cups milk 2 cups heavy cream

Boil first 8 ingredients until tender, about 15 minutes.



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# **Agricultural Literacy**

**AG LIT BIT** 

Let The Celebration Begin



Ag in the Classroom

It's a big year and we hope you'll be a part of the celebration! You're going to be hearing a lot about 100 in 2020 as that is the theme of the year for the Cook County Farm Bureau as we reach our 100th anniversary.

The Farm Bureau was established in March of 1920, the same year my grandparents were celebrating the arrival of their first (and only) son, who was born that January in Independence, Louisiana. It's crazy to think my father would be celebrating his 100th birthday this month and would have been a bit older than our Farm Bureau. Ironically, his family had a small farm and existed on what they raised, selling the excess (like strawberries) to buy other necessities.

During that time, one farmer fed about 10 people (enough for their family), whereas today one U.S. farmer feeds about 166 people. That number has changed due to many factors, including

technology. What has evolved over the past 100 years will likely change much faster during the next 100 years.

Just last month alone, we saw researchers writing about future "Dropcopters" (using drones to pollinate crops), Artificial Intelligence to track cows (using bovine facial recognition and hide patterns), use of solar panels on farm fields including growing crops under the panels (cranberries for example), and use of technology to create a solution to extend the shelf life of produce (imagine bananas or avocados lasting far longer).

It's never been a more interesting (or challenging) time for our industry, although they probably thought that a century ago. Growing A Nation (https:// growinganation.org/) is a wonderful resource that provides a timeline into the history of agriculture to see how we got to where we are today. Prohibition led the headlines back in January of 1920 and 100 years later cannabis is the hot topic.

Not sure what's next but we here at CCFB hope you will enjoy celebrating our birthday with us on March 28, 2020

# Calling all schools: Service Project

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# **Good Food Brings Winter Comfort**

These days, my husband's favorite supper of roast beef with mashed potatoes, gravy and homemade rolls prompts him to ask, "What's the occasion?" My response: "We're home."

With both kids in middle school, a night at home free from extracurricular activities provides reason to celebrate some down time. Comfort foods flow from this availability, which triggers the desire to cook and bake with an enthusiasm that tackles even dish duty with high spirits. The aroma of home-baked goods and from-scratch meals fill our home, hugging hearts before taming empty stomachs. While I love to occasionally dine out and pay someone else to handle the food prep and clean-up, nothing quite matches having or making the time to enjoy the magic of a home-cooked meal around the family dinner table.

Food makes us feel good, and the farm women before me set flavor standards and meal-time priorities that I embrace and share with our kids. Our household teaches respect for mealtime as a family. We also deliver a hands-on education in how food grows, whether in our farm's fields, our backyard garden, the hen house or Grandpa's cattle pasture.

The kids see that the eggs they gather make it into the homemade rolls. We top those rolls with jelly,

home-made from the backyard grapevine. From the freezer, we pull steaks and roast beef processed from last year's steer that Grandpa raised. This 30-cubic-foot appliance also holds last summer's sweet corn, homemade pesto from the back-porch basil plant and broilers the kids helped raise.

This winter, roast beef with mashed potatoes one night may make beef stew with dumplings the next. Our daughter loves from-scratch chicken pot pie with our whole farm-raised broilers. The meal takes hours to prepare but tastes so good that we want to lick the ramekin. Our son cheers for meatballs, formed from our freezer beef and flavored with garden onions stored in the basement. We declare Sunday nights "pizza night" and, when time allows, opt for homemade topped with pizza sauce the kids preserved with me last August.

At another level entirely, Grandma used to butcher a chicken on Sunday morning for fried chicken after church. I take much simpler routes, but still share in ways to celebrate good food. Sometimes, that means leftover chicken noodle soup for Sunday lunch.

# **Family Farm and Food Bytes**

STARTUP COMPANY USES DRONES TO HELP POLLINATE TREE CROPS (FarmWeekNow) - A New York-based startup company is using drones to help pollinate tree crops, according to Growing Produce. Dropcopter relied on hexacopters to augment pollination of such crops as almonds, apples, cherries and pears. Three years of trials showed drone-augmented pollination increased yields by 25% to 50%. Not many trees are needed to harvest enough pollen for the entire orchard, according to the company and some buds remain on the trees whose buds are harvested. The drones follow a predetermined set flight plan, and the pollen is contained in a patented device that scatters pollen from the drone. Drones fly up and down the rows about 10 feet above the tree canopy and can cover about 20 to 25 acres an hour.

**GOODYEAR TO INCREASE SOY OIL USE (FarmWeek)** - Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company's latest sustainability report shares the company's goal of increasing soybean oil consumption by 25% next year. The company also wants to fully replace all petroleum in its tires by 2040.

## PRAIRIE FARMS CAPTURES AWARDS AT NATIONAL CHEESE

**CONTEST (FarmWeekNow)** - Prairie Farms Dairy, an Illinois Farm Bureau affiliate, recently won 14 awards at the 2019 National Milk Producers Federation Championship Cheese Contest held in New Orleans. Among the awards were four first-place, three second-place, and five third-place finishes. Prairie Farms Dairy also won the Best in Class Cottage Cheese Award and dominated the cottage cheese and Swiss cheese categories by taking 10 of 12 awards.

**U.S. FOOD MOST AFFORDABLE (AFBF)** - A new American Farm Bureau Federation® (AFBF) analysis shows that the U.S. has the most affordable food supply in the world. Megan Nelson, AFBF economic analyst, researched global food prices and found Americans enjoy the most affordable overall price for food at home – about 4.8% of disposable income. She also found people in high-income countries spend 4% to 6% of disposable income on food, while consumers in low-income countries spend more than 50% of their household budget on food.

# County Assessor Deadline for Farmland Questionnaire/Affidavit

The Cook County Assessor's office has a deadline of January 31st for filing the 2020 Cook County Farmland Questionnaire/Affidavit. Forms are available at www.cookcountyassessor.com, click Forms>Farms>Download. Filing of this form is necessary on an annual basis to maintain the farm assessment of the property that is farmed in Cook County. The Cook County Assessor's Office annually reviews the status of all properties classified as farms in the County. If the affidavit is not provided, the county will reclassify its usage which will likely increase the assessment value and increase the tax burden as a result.

We recommend that you maintain a copy of the document for your records for future use. The Cook County Farm Bureau does provide a notary service for members (required on the form). Please call the office at 708-354-3276 in advance to verify that Melanie or Kelli will be available to provide this service.

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# Farm Bureau Delegates Approve Cook County's Resolution Submittals



The Cook County Farm Bureau was well represented at the Illinois Farm Bureau annual meeting held in Chicago in December. From right to left, Janet McCabe, Todd Price, Roger Freeman, and Mike Rauch served as delegates on delegate floor during the debate to create the 2020 Illinois Farm Bureau policy book on agricultural issues and concerns. Cook County Farm Bureau led improvements in the policy book on the topics of government assisted nutrition programs, healthcare and equine agriculture. The Board of Directors donated a cordless drill/impact wrench for the silent auction to raise funds for ag literacy. Board members and spouses attended and participated in various functions and meetings throughout the event.

Through a grassroots process, Farm Bureau members submitted the following resolutions to delegates at the 2018 Illinois Agricultural Association® annual meeting.

Government Assisted Nutrition Programs

We support: An exemption from Criterion A and B for retailers to the USDA Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) retailer rules to allow seasonal and onfarm businesses to accept SNAP benefits.

To be SNAP-authorized, a store generally must meet one of two eligibility standards: Criterion A (staple food stock) or Criterion B (staple food sales). Staple foods are the basic food items that make up a significant portion of an individual's diet and are usually prepared at home and consumed as a major component of a meal. Staple food categories include vegetables or fruits; meat, poultry, or fish; dairy products; and breads or cereals.

This resolution speaks directly towards Criterion B (staple food sales). To be eligible under Criterion B, stores must have more than 50% of their total gross retail sales from items in one or more of the four staple food categories (i.e. butcher shops, bakeries, fruit and vegetables specialty stores).

By removing the cap smaller businesses are eligible to accept SNAP benefits.

**Health Care** 

We support: 17. Patient access to critical access hospitals

(CAH) in rural and underserved areas.

The "critical access hospital" (CAH) designation is designed to reduce the financial vulnerability of rural hospitals and improve access to healthcare by keeping essential services in rural communities. There are 57 CAHs in Illinois. To accomplish this goal, CAHs receive certain benefits, such as cost-based reimbursement for Medicare services. Hospitals must meet the following conditions to obtain CAH designation: 25 or fewer acute care inpatient beds; located more than 35 miles from another hospital (exceptions may apply); maintain an annual average length of stay of 96 hours or less for acute care patients; and 24/7 emergency care services.

#### **Equine Agriculture**

We oppose:

- 1. Closing existing equestrian trails on federal, state, and property other than property where irreversible damage could occur.
- 2. Efforts to terminate, ban, effectively ban, or create an undue financial hardship relating to the use of horses in commerce, service, agriculture, husbandry, transportation, ranching, entertainment, education, or exhibition

There's been numerous attempts by governments to limit the use of horses, including attempts locally in the City of Chicago.

# Manifolds, Manolos, and Manure

Dear Congressman, It's me, Bona Heinsohn. I think you've might have forgotten about me amid politics, political posturing, and campaign fundraising.

Public Relations
Let me remind you. My farmer is a third-generation family famer who raises corn, soybean, wheat, and alfalfa in northern Illinois.

Nearly half of our acres are certified organic by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. We also have a medium-sized registered Holstein dairy herd complete with our blue-eyed girl's winter show calf named "Lickey". For several years, our milk went to Dean Foods in Huntley but more recently we market it through a farmer-owned co-operative, Dairy Farmers of American based in Michigan.

Our soybeans go overseas to China and Japan and our organic certified corn is used as chicken feed.

We feed our alfalfa to our cattle.

Our small family boosts a blue-eyed girl who

loves horses, her trumpet, playing third base in softball, and school. We also have a big-little boy with no official eye color who loves farming, real tools (not those plastic ones in the toy section), tractors, and his extra-large cat named "Xanadau". These two, affectionately known as "children of the corn" are our future. Our fourth generation. We want nothing more than for them to follow their dad and grandpa around asking if they're old enough to milk a cow, drive a tractor, farm. They're our legacy.

As family farmers we rely heavily on trade and access to international markets. And Congressman, let's be frank. This is where you come in. In 1994, the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) reduced trade barriers between the United States, Canada, and Mexico. The U.S.-Mexico-Canada Agreement (USMCA) is in a lot of ways an updated version of NAFTA but is expected to increase U.S. agricultural exports by two billion. This agreement needs to be ratified by

the United States and Canada. Mexico has already ratified the agreement but will need to ratify the recent changes. Canada is expected to ratify the agreement in parallel to the United States. Ratify the agreement. Help farmers. Help automobile manufacturers. Help the economy.

Speaking of trade, rumor is that there's a tentative agreement with China. Farmers need China as a trading partner. The phase one deal calls for China to purchase \$50 billion in agricultural products and \$200 billion in U.S. goods and services over a two-year period. Under this agreement, snapback tariffs will not go into effect.

Congressman, what we need most is an advocate for farmers. Someone who is willing to learn more about how food is grown and raised. Someone who is willing to stand up and push for agreements, legislation, and policy beneficial to Illinois farmers.

In the New Year, can you, Congressman be our advocate?
