A lot of pressure to get this right!

A few weeks ago, my wife and I flew to Washington, D.C. for a very special ceremony. I had the distinct honor to "pin" sergeant stripes onto my youngest son who serves our country with pride in the U.S. Army. 
CENTENNIAL LEGACY PATIO TO BE CREATED TO BENEFIT FOUNDATION

Recipe of the Month: Rhubarb Berry Coffee Cake Joyce Holste, Midlothian

Ingredients

1 pkg yellow cake mix (regular size) divided % c packed brown sugar

2 T butter

2/3 c chopped walnuts

1 c (8 oz) sour cream 2 eggs

% c all-purpose flour 1 % c finely chopped fresh or frozen rhubarb 1 ½ c sliced fresh strawberries

In small bowl, combine 1/2 cup cake mix and sugar; cut in butter until crumbly. Add walnuts; set aside. In another bowl, combine sour cream, eggs, flour, and remaining cake mix; beat on low speed for 30 seconds. Beat on medium for 2 minutes. Fold in rhubarb and strawberries. Spread into greased 13 x 9-inch baking dish. Sprinkle with reserved crumb mixture. Bake 350 degrees for 35-40 minutes or until toothpick inserted comes out clean. Cool on wire rack. If desired, drizzle with frosting or serve with ice cream. Yield 12-15 servings.

The past decades appear to have changed the landscape of education drastically, but have things really changed? Tools and terminology changes moved from encyclopedias to Google, filmstrip

projectors to YouTube, chalkboards to Smartboards, slide rules to calculators to name a few.

Report cards still evaluate students on their mastery of reading, writing, and math while other subjects are no longer emphasized such as handwriting, spelling, art, music and physical education. I know the most important part of my report card was the non-subject areas including effort, citizenship, work habits and attendance.

As the Farm Bureau turns 100 this month, the emphasis on literacy is just important now as it was in 1920. Mr. Dooley, the first president of the Cook County Farm Bureau®, sought "to make the Cook County Farm Bureau second to none in the state". That goal has not changed today in 2020, nor has the goal of ensuring that our educational efforts are second to none in teaching our communities about ag literacy.

In the early days of our farm bureau, there was an understanding of where food came from which was lost as the years progressed. As early as the 1940s, the Farm Bureau had an exhibit at the county fair at Soldier Field educating Chicagoans about the 3,700 farms in our

county and many people realized for the first time that agriculture was right here in Cook County.

When our Ag in the Classroom began in the 1980s we had our work cut out for us as we began to provide free programming to schools, communities and teachers and we haven't stop since. It's crazy to think that all these years later the most common comment we hear is, "Who knew these facts about agriculture?" There are new questions about GMO's and plant-based meats, but most are still wanting to know the difference between hay and straw, sweet corn and field corn and organic vs. conventional.

My sense is 2120 will bring new terminology along with new ways of farming, but the same excited and curious students will be partaking in Agriculture in the Classroom lessons. I'm not sure if we'll be there presenting it to them or if they'll be going on field trips to farms in their space-aged school buses.

*Thank you to those who carried the AITC torch before me. Our impact would not have begun if it were not for the early efforts of Merlyn and Helen Heyen who began our outreach through Agriculture "Story Tellers". Their message continued through the leadership of Ag in the Classroom Coordinators Gail Petersdorff, Katie Schmidbauer and Haley Loy-Siergiej and through the through talented, passionate AITC Presenters who have reached over a half million students.

FFA students from two Chicago high schools participated in Agriculture Leadership Academy funded by the Cook County Farm Bureau Foundation in conjunction with Compeer Financial. The theme for this year's program was Urban Ag Careers and included visits three Chicago organizations. The 39 students first visited Gourmet Gorilla, a healthy school lunch provider that has grown from providing 200 school lunches per day to over 40,000 in just ten years. Students learned the USDA requirements for preparing a healthy breakfast and lunch and were put to the test to create their own lunches using ingredients that met the strict guidelines. The focus of the next tour was horticulture at the Garfield Park Conservatory where our group took a behind the scenes tour of their greenhouses. The guides explained the growing conditions necessary for tropical and subtropical plants and the work that is involved all year to keep their indoor and outdoor gardens vibrant and healthy. A Q&A followed the tour which provided sound advice for entering jobs related to plant sciences. A panel discussion on food waste closed out the day at Hazel Technologies Inc. The panel was made up of Hazel staff and management, along with partner organizations including Mighty Vines, Mindful Waste and Refed. The day allowed these high school sophomore and juniors to explore jobs within the food, horticulture and technology segments of our industry. We thank all the company leaders and staff for taking time to discuss the careers available in their organizations and the path that led them to their jobs.





Calving Cameras Intend to Simplify Season

How we care for our farm's small herd of beef cows gives off a nostalgic vibe: The lineage of the cows traces back to Grandpa's herd. Cows give birth to calves in the shelter of a century-old barn. Hedge posts harvested from the farm frame the pasture fence, and we paid the local FFA chapter to build the feed bunks in the cattle lots.

I love all that old-fashioned charm but share equal excitement with some modern technology about to bless a barn that predates electricity. Soon, a cellular hot spot and motion-sensing cameras will monitor activity in the calving pens. The men who built that barn in the early 1900s would have passed me off as kooky to tell of such a thing.

This quality-of-life improvement means my dad can use his smartphone to view live video and hear live audio from the calving pens while in bed at midnight. In fact, he can view the barn's activities from any place in the world where he has phone reception. He used to pull on the coveralls and boots to enter the chilly night to check cows with behaviors that signaled an imminent birth. He still may lose sleep during calving season, but only when the activity on his phone warrants it.

Tech-savvy cattlemen and women adopted this technology years ago, and we're late to the luxury. I don't expect these calving cameras to trump machinery auto guidance, my dad's favorite farm invention of his lifetime. But, fingers crossed, the system makes his top 10 list.

The potential impact extends to all of us in the family, kids included. Between afterschool activities and homework, the kids can check calving action from my phone, keeping them connected to the farm when middle school schedules sometimes limit it.

I remember those impressionable moments of my childhood when I watched Dad or Grandpa milk a cow to feed colostrum to a newborn calf struggling to nurse. On occasion, they pulled calves, assisting the cow with a difficult birth. I learned the reality that a few didn't make it. Yet, I witnessed healthy calves taking their miraculous first steps within just 20 minutes of birth.

Now, modern technology makes this viewing experience accessible miles from the barn.

READERS CHOOSE PRAIRIE FARMS (FarmWeek) - Prairie Farms Cottage Cheese Cups have been named to Dairy Foods Magazine's Top 10 Readers' Choice list of best dairy products from 2019. Prairie Farms Dairy introduced its award-winning cottage cheese last fall with the introduction of Small Batch Cups with flavor options including Garden Veggie, Zesty Fiesta, Pineapple, Strawberry and Peach

DEADLINE LOOMS FOR REAL ID DRIVER'S LICENSES (FarmWeek) - October 1 is the federal deadline requiring a Real ID driver's license, valid passport or military ID to go through transportation security administration (TSA) checkpoints or enter a secure federal building, such as a courthouse. After the October deadline, Illinois residents may still use the traditional driver's license for identification but those licenses will no longer be valid as a federal identification. The Illinois Real ID resembles the traditional Illinois driver's license except for a **star in a gold circle in the upper right of the license.**

ILLINOIS CORN FARMERS GO ON OFFENSE DURING THE BIG GAME (Illinois Farm Families) - During the biggest game in football, IL Corn went on offense to remind consumers around the state that Illinois runs on homegrown corn. Viewers in major Illinois TV markets saw Illinois corn farmers during the Feb. 2 game's commercial breaks. A 30-second "Illinois Runs on Homegrown Corn" commercial showcased the Swanson family, one of the many thousands of farmers who grow corn, a product that drives our state's economy.

CAROL STREAM JOINS B20 CLUB (FarmWeek) - The Village of Carol Stream has become a new member of the B20 Club in recognition of the municipality's work to reduce vehicle emissions and improve air quality for its residents. The B20 Club is a partnership between the Illinois Soybean Association checkout program and the American Lung Association that recognizes Illinois – based fleets that are committed to using biodiesel blends of 20% or greater.

U.S. AGRICULTURE SECRETARY UNSURE IF CORONAVIRUS WILL SLOW CHINA'S FARM IMPORTS (Reuters) - U.S. Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue said he does not know whether China's coronavirus outbreak will upset Beijing's pledge to radically increase purchases of American farm goods as part of the countries' recent trade deal. The virus has cast further doubt on China's ability to buy \$36.5 billion of U.S. agricultural goods in 2020.

AFBF BOOK OF YEAR FULL OF BEANS (FarmWeek) - The American Farm Bureau® Foundation for Agriculture presented its 13th book of the year award to Peggy Thomas for Full of Beans: Henry Ford Grows a Car. The book describes Henry Ford's drive to incorporate soybeans into every part of his life. After the Great Depression, the famous carmaker and businessman wanted to support ailing farmers and using research at his Ford Motor Company, Ford and his team discovered that soybeans were the perfect answer, especially for plastic parts.

EPA REASSERTS GLYPHOSATE SAFE TO USE, PROBABLY NOT CARCINOGENIC (Agri-Pulse) - The Environmental Protection Agency reaffirms that glyphosate, the active ingredient in the herbicide Roundup, is safe to use and unlikely to cause cancer.

CHICAGO MAY BAN SINGLE USE CONTAINERS (FarmWeek) - Two Chicago council members are proposing to ban single-use polystyrene food containers and reduce use of plastic utensils in the city, according to an "Eater" report from the Specialty Food Association. The proposal would require reusable plates and bowls at dine-in restaurants. Plastic straws, paper napkins and foil could be used – if compostable or recyclable. Plastic silverware and drink tops could be used only if the customer asked for them or at "self-serve stations".

FARMLAND MARKET FIRMLY GROUNDED (FarmWeekNow) - Farmland prices have eased down 15 to 20% in some areas of the country after reaching record highs in 2013–14 but generally remain strong due in part to a tight supply of available land, healthy demand and low interest rates. The Market Facilitation Program has, over the past 2 years, helped buffer some farmers from significant income pressures due to low commodity prices. debt to asset ratio (13.6% average) has increased but still is low historically speaking.

E-COMMERCE PILOT ALLOWS FARMERS TO SELL DIRECT TO CONSUMERS (FarmWeekNow) - A new e-commerce platform allows Illinois farmers to sell directly to consumers through a pilot project launched recently by the Illinois Farm Bureau® and MarketMaker, an interactive database. Through the pilot program, any Illinois farmer with a MarketMaker account may set up an electronic store at no cost. Farmers may have to pay a small transaction fee on each order received. Farmers may choose payment terms in different options, such as delivery to customers or for customers to pick up their purchases. No special equipment is needed; however, farmers need a computer and Internet access for e-commerce transactions.

FARMER VETERAN GROUPS EXCITED COUNTRY ARTIST CATERING WITH FARMER VETERAN FOOD (FarmWeekNow) - The national and Illinois Farmer Veteran Coalitions praised country artist Brantley Gilbert's decision to buy food produced by a farmer veteran to cater meals during his 25-city tour. Gilbert's agents announced his team would work with the Farmer Veteran Coalition to buy products for catering at each concert stop. The plan is to spotlight the value locally produced meat, dairy and produce can make on each community.

ILLINOIS LOSES 9% OF DAIRIES; FARMERS INVESTIGATE OPTIONS (FarmWeekNow)— Farmers at the annual Illinois Dairy Summit in Bloomington considered options to improve their bottom lines. And for good reason. The recent upturn in milk prices could tail off through winter. This, after a multiyear run of tight margins and losses, forced some farmers out of business.

ENTRY LEVEL DRIVER TRAINING REQUIREMENT DELAYED (IFB) - The Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) has announced a 2-year delay in the implementation of Entry Level Driver Training (EDLT) requirements. Beginning February 7, 2022, before a driver may apply for or upgrade to a Class A or B CDL or seek an endorsement for hazardous materials (H), passengers (P), or school busses (S), the driver must complete entry-level driver training.

This training only applies to drivers applying for a CDL, upgrading to a new class of CDL, or seeking an additional endorsement. Those renewing an existing CDL and not seeking to change the class of license or add an endorsement will not be required to undergo training. Those with a non-CDL driver's license are also not required to have training. This includes the non-CDL J50, and the non-CDL J51 license available to those that qualify for farmer exemptions from the CDL.

Cook County Farm Bureau® works hard to be a leader on legislative and regulatory issues that impact members. In January, Farm Bureau members received a 'SNAP' Viewpoint Survey to gather members' thoughts on lawmakers' salaries and ethics.

Eighty-four percent of members responding believe that lawmakers who resign their seat in the Illinois General Assembly before the end of their term should only be paid for the days that they work.

Eighty-four percent of members also believe that elected officials should not be a paid lobbyist.

Waters of the United States (WOTUS) was a rule created by the President Obama administration that put much of the country's "waters" under control of federal jurisdiction. Farm Bureau members have been fighting for a reasonable alternative since that time.


In January, USEPA and the Army Corps of Engineers have finalized the WOTUS replacement rule with the new and improved "Navigable Waters Protection Rule." The agencies provided more

- Features that only contain water in direct response to rainfall
- Many ditches, including most roadside and farm ditches
- Farm and stock watering ponds
- Waste treatment systems; and
- Prior converted cropland
- The agencies are looking forward to moving into the implementation phase of this rule. As additional details are revealed, we will continue to share with members.

Manifolds, Manolos, and Manure

Since 2010, Cook County Farm Bureau® has operated a Political Action Committee (PAC) designed to support candidates who are supportive of the policies, priorities and mission of the Farm Bureau while promoting the

economic and social well-being of farmers and farmrelated interests in Cook County.

Since its inception, the PAC has made 54 endorsements. Not all incumbents. Not all challengers. Not all major party candidates. But candidates who Governance Committee members felt would make the largest impact in their district and the county.

Members of the Cook CFB PAC Governance Committee are charged with making endorsements. When considering a candidate, members consider the results of the candidates' interviews, questionnaires, support of Farm Bureau policies, and when applicable, voting record.

Of the candidates running for Cook County office, Governance Committee members interviewed candidates for Cook County Clerk. State's Attorney, Board of Review and Metropolitan Water Reclamation District.

Four years ago, Cook CFB PAC endorsed then incumbent Anita Alvarez over Donna More and Kim Foxx. Four years ago, the PAC passed on endorsing Foxx due to her lack of prosecutorial experience and

the fact that she served as Preckwinkle's Chief of Staff during the county's largest sales tax increase. Cook County Farm Bureau strongly opposed and actively worked against the sales tax increase. Political newcomer Bill Conway is a fresh face and has new ideas. For Cook CFB PAC, its Donna More. More brings a wealth of knowledge and experience to the race and is natural fit for the office. More will take the politics out of the State's Attorney Office.

On the Republican ticket for State's Attorney there are two highly qualified candidates vying for votes. Christopher Pfannkuche is a pilot and an experienced litigator, author and trainer. For Cook CFB PAC, it's Patrick 'Pat' O'Brien. O'Brien, like Pfannkuche, is a skilled litigator but he's also a mentor and a leader and what the State's Attorney's office needs most is a leader.

Four years ago, Cook CFB PAC railed against then incumbent Dorothy Brown and the numerous investigations, allegations and missteps. Under her leadership the office has continued to dog technology upgrades and electronic filing advancements and for these reasons and many more Cook CFB PAC endorsed Jacob Meister. Unfortunately, Meister was unsuccessful in 2016. This round he faces off against former Commissioner Richard Boykin, Board of Review Commissioner Michael Cabonargi and Senator Iris Martinez. All four candidates would be a radical step forward. For Cook CFB PAC its Jacob Meister.

Meister is a longtime attorney and has successfully litigated cases in state and federal courts throughout the country. His experience has given him extensive knowledge of how different court systems are operated and how the Cook County court system should run. Meister was also the only candidate of the four who challenged Brown rather than waiting for a Brown free contest.

The race for Metropolitan Water Reclamation District (MWRD) is crowded. Newcomers Mike Cashman, Patricia Theresa Flynn and Eria Corral Sepulveda are outstanding candidates with new ideas and will be outstanding leaders. However, in this race for Cook CFB PAC it's the three incumbents- Frank Avila, Cameron 'Cam' Davis and Kimberly Dubuclet- who truly stood out. Avila is an engineer with a wealth of experience. Davis was a standout candidate two years ago and remains committed to working with partners, including Farm Bureau to improve the environment. Two years ago, Cook CFB PAC endorsed Dubuclet citing her legislative experience and although the Illinois General Assembly is different than the MWRD, her experience and contacts makes her an excellent commissioner.

Members Urged to Complete 2020 Census Survey

The national 2020 United States census is set to begin in earnest this spring. This will be the first time the U.S. Census Bureau will ask household residents to complete the survey online.

The Illinois Farm Bureau® (IFB) is seeking a strong response from the farm and rural community and has asked county farm bureaus to become involved in the process by assisting members gain access to online survey completion. Each county farm bureau has received an iPad to be used in coordination with IFB's efforts to assist both members and non-members in getting access to the internet to complete their 2020 Census survey.

"The U.S. Census is directly related to Illinois' representation in the U.S. House of Representatives," said Illinois Farm Bureau President Richard Guebert, Jr. "With Illinois losing population over the last several years, the state could lose one, maybe two, seats in the U.S. House. That makes this survey extremely important for the state to have widespread participation and accurate responses from its citizens."

Reapportioning occurs after each U.S. Census, starting with the number of seats given to each state in the U.S. House of Representatives. From there, boundaries will be redrawn for those seats as well as for the General Assembly and county

Federal funding heavily relies on Census results. U.S. Census data determines how \$675 billion dollars is distributed, impacting education, fire and emergency response services, transportation, employment, housing, health care and public policy.

Illinois Farm Bureau offers the following timeline for the 2020 Census:

- In mid-March, the U.S. Census Bureau will send an "Invitation to Respond" to every citizen. Residents may fill out their census online or call the listed contact number to either fill the census out via phone or to request a hard copy via U.S. Postal Service.
- April 1, 2020 is Census Day. IFB members and non-members are encouraged to make this date their goal for census completion and to consider what their household will look like on that date when answering questions.
- After Census Day, U.S. Census Bureau representatives will make home visits to assist citizens in filling out the survey in person.
 Completing a survey is required for every U.S.

Soil Testing Kits Available

Cook County Farm Bureau offers both members and non-members an opportunity to test their garden or lawn soil by purchasing a soil testing kit. Soil, in its natural state, is rarely fertile enough for the best growth of plants. Usually, it is necessary to supplement the earth's store of plant nutrients before we can obtain the most vigorous lawn, the most abundant and brilliant flowers, the most aesthetically satisfying trees/shrubs and the greatest yield of tasty and nutritious vegetables, or crops. Test your soil pH, potassium, phosphorous and other key elements to begin the soil improvement process.

Complete kit guidelines and instructions, as well as mailing information included in the test kit and members will receive test results and basic recommendations within two weeks. Members are also encouraged to contact the University of Illinois Extension Master Gardener Resource Center, available at the Farm Bureau office starting April 13th to mid-November, for assistance with gardening and lawn questions.


