Cook County Farm Bureau® and Partners Raise Cash and Food Donations for Local Food Pantries

Cook County Farm Bureau® Celebrates its 22nd Annual Food Checkout Day

Together with partners, Cook County Farm Bureau® donated much needed food staples and essential non-food items to six Cook County food pantries. Donations were raised in celebration of Food Checkout Day. Food Checkout Day celebrates the healthy and nutritious food local farmers grow and raise by providing food or cash donations to people in need.

In light of the tremendous pressure created by COVID-19, in addition to launching Farm Bureau's largest community effort to date, Cook County Farm Bureau matched members' monetary donations. Over \$11,000 was donated to local Cook County pantries in celebration of Food Checkout Day this year and the healthy and nutritious food grown and raised by local farmers.

The donations directly benefited the one in seven individuals in Cook County who are hungry. Partner food pantries, Church of the Holy Spirit Food Pantry, Schaumburg; Elk Grove Townships Food Pantry, Elk Grove Village; Elsie's Food Pantry, Palos Hills; Hattie B. Williams Food Pantry, Oak Forest; Lakeview Pantry, Chicago;

and Share Food Share Love, Brookfield were selected by local representatives from COUNTRY Financial®. Representatives were from the following COUNTRY Financial agencies Chicago North, Chicago South, Chicago Northwest, Chicago Northeast, Orland Park, and South Holland COUNTRY Financial offices.

"Cook County and Illinois farmers are committed to growing safe and nutritious food for our families and for others," said Janet McCabe, President of Cook County Farm Bureau®. "Food Checkout Day allows us to recognize the importance of healthy, nutritious food while supporting local families in need."

For 19 years, Cook County Farm Bureau has partnered with Ronald McDonald House Charities® of Chicagoland and Northwest Indiana. Through the generosity of partners for nearly two decades, Farm Bureau donated over \$145,000 and nearly 100,000 pounds of food.

In 2012 and again in 2021, Farm Bureau's food pantry efforts were named a Summit Award winner by the American Society of Association Executives (ASAE). The Summit Award recognizes the positive impact that non-profit associations have on their community.

The dairy industry jumped on National Nutrition Month by promoting a wide variety of milk and dairy foods that provide endless options to meet an individual's personal needs, tastes, and preferences within a variety of cultures.

Recipe of the Month:

Spring Greens Mixed Berry Salad with Garlic Vinaigrette

Jodie Shields, Partners Spring 2022

Garlic Vinaigrette:

- 3 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil
- 2 tablespoons white wine vinegar
- 4 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

Salad:

- 6 cups mixed spring greens (about 6 ounces)
- 1 cup fresh strawberries, sliced
- 1 cup fresh blueberries
- 1 cup fresh blackberries
- 6 tablespoons slivered almonds



In a small bowl, whisk together the oil, vinegar, garlic, mustard, salt and pepper. Set aside. Place all spring greens into a large bowl. Add the vinaigrette and toss to coat. Divide the salad between 6 salad plates and top each with an equal amount of strawberries, blueberries and blackberries. Sprinkle 1 tablespoon of almonds over each salad before serving. Tips: For a smoky flavor, toast the almonds in a preheated oven at 325 degrees for 10 minutes before topping the salad. Don't like blackberries? Feel free to toss in your favorite mixed berries.

Board of Directors Develops Implementation Strategy To Meet Goals, Objectives



The Cook County Farm Bureau Board of Directors, during their March board meeting, approved actions from the February board strategic planning day including the activation of a new Volunteer Management System. The plan will be similar to a human resources approach to recruiting, onboarding, training, engaging, recognizing and rewarding, and providing feedback for volunteers. The plan recognizes that there are various levels of engagement by members serving as volunteers and all are in important part of the organization's effort and progress.

The board reviewed its Goals and Objectives for the organization. Action items for each of the listed goals and objectives were identified and approved to help the organization achieve each.

- Recruit and retain all types of voting (M & PM) and associate members to reverse the net-loss trend of membership within the organization through regular contact, engagement, enhanced communications, broadened appeal, and delivery of membership benefits/services.
- Increase farm income opportunities for all farmers and farm related businesses, traditional and specialty, in the Cook County area.
- Represent the farmer and farmland

- owner interests through Farm Bureau policy at the local, regional, state, and national government level and communicate policies and issues to members.
- Seek to build trust and knowledge with consumers, educators, and students through farm and food facts, information, public relations activities, charitable support, and ag literacy educational efforts.
- Renew and maintain relationship building efforts with county and other local elected officials and offices.

Internal Board action items were also developed related to evaluating the effectiveness in achieving mission, goals, and objectives, review of the organization's investment policy/strategy to ensure future financial stability, evaluation of the organization's technology for effective Farm Bureau communications, programming, and delivery of services, increase involvement within the organization through implementation of the Volunteer Management System and review leadership succession plan.

The Board of Directors reviewed and approved an organizational Diversity and Inclusion statement: "At Our Table, All Are Welcome."






With Earth Day this month on April 22nd we wanted to take a look at how important water is to all of us, including our farmers. The subject of water is not a new topic, as you'll see below.



Water is one of earth's most valuable resources, and one of its most scarce. Out of the earth's total supply of water, 97% is salt water and only 3% is fresh water.

Furthermore, the amount of fresh water trapped in glaciers and icecaps is 2.2%, leaving only .08% of the earth's total water available for everyday human use.

Water is a finite resource that continues to move through its natural cycle, meaning that we are drinking the same water that dinosaurs did millions of years ago!

Dusty Truth

Roads (gravel ones included) key part of food supply chain



A West Coast cousin is guaranteed to call out "rush hour," when more than one car passes the farmyard during our annual game of wiffle ball. Since childhood, we have played a ball game every year that our city cousins visit the farm. Now adults, they still poke fun at the traffic pattern of primarily the mailman and some neighbors who wave as they pass.

Back home in the city, my cousins travel well-lit residential streets and expressways. Out here in the heart of farm country, few roads are lined. Certain stretches of our rural roads may become impassable in winter. Road curves can measure nearly 90 degrees, and some intersections of narrow gravel roads lack stop signs, relatively common in Illinois' most rural, low-traffic settings. That's just a fact of living in rural, more remote areas.

Urban and rural alike, Illinoisians try to get from point A to point B for jobs, school, business and social events. Road infrastructure proves important to all Illinois businesses with goods to move, families with places to go, and workers with jobs to complete. In an urban setting, people most commonly travel lined asphalt or concrete highways. In rural areas, unstriped blacktops and dusty gravel road connect us to destinations, including the fields that produce food, feed, and biofuels.

The primary difference is that rural roads, generally, are made of less durable materials than urban or high-traffic county roads. And that reduced durability can limit activity. In the late winter and spring when the frost exits the subsoil, rural roads begin to soften and weight restrictions impact the movement of commodities from the farm to market. In the summer heat, oil-and-chipped roads can bleed, demanding more roadchips, or small rocks, to protect the surface.

About a mile south and a bit east of our wiffle ball game, the one-lane bridge sits crooked to the road. The Laura Blacktop near town has a crumbling shoulder. And you'll want to avoid my road in the thaw of March unless you desire the unofficial title of "most deserving" in the car wash line. While in high school, I wrote well wishes in the gravel grime on my car for our state-bound basketball team. I'm not sure that I made my city cousins jealous.

"The Ag Innovation Challenge is an outstanding avenue for identifying and supporting startup businesses striving to solve the problems facing rural America. I look forward to seeing the innovative, resourceful and creative solutions that Challenge applicants submit."

Applications remain open through April 29, and the 10 semi-finalist teams will be announced Sept. 13. Each of the semi-finalist teams will be awarded \$10,000 and a chance to compete to advance to the final round where four teams will receive an additional \$5,000 each. The final four teams will compete to win:

 Farm Bureau Ag Innovation Challenge Winner, for a total of \$50,000

- Farm Bureau Ag Innovation Challenge Runner-up, for a total of \$20,000
- People's Choice Team selected by public vote, for an additional \$5,000 (all 10 semifinalist teams compete for this honor)

Prior to the live pitch competition, the top 10 semi-finalist teams will participate in pitch training and mentorship from Cornell University's SC Johnson College of Business faculty, and network with representatives from the Agriculture Department's Rural Business Investment Companies.

Recent winners of the Ag Innovation
Challenge include Grain Weevil Corporation, a
grain bin safety and management robot that
improves farmer well-being by controlling
risks and costs (2022 Ag Innovation Challenge
Winner) and Harvust, a software platform
that helps farmers successfully hire, train
and communicate with employees (2021 Ag
Innovation Challenge Winner). Other examples of

as well as detailed eligibility guidelines and the

I loved civics. Memorizing the Constitutional amendments. Differentiating between the powers of the Executive, Judicial, and Legislative branches. Explaining the concept of checks and balances. The elastic clause. Interstate commerce.

Just last week she asked which Constitutional amendments I thought were most important. I thought maybe we were connecting. Maybe she was interested. Nope. Come to find out her question was less "get to know your mom" and more "I don't want to do my homework." I reminded her that I was not a pre-teen girl and asked her which amendments were most important to her. Apparently, the ones that start with an exaggerated sigh.

I did find out after the fact that one of the amendments she listed was the repeal of prohibition. And her reason why, so her mother and father could be happy and not so mean. Cue my eye roll.

Once she finishes her light dive into American government, she moves on to Illinois government. Civics has also taught our blue-eyed girl about political parties. One evening she asked my farmer and I which political party we vote for. We've never hid our political leanings. General and Special Purpose Units of Government Add up in Illinois

Understanding the different types of government might help frame the question, "how much is too much?" In Illinois we have general-purpose and special-purpose units of government. Our general-purpose units are counties, townships and municipalities. As a general-purpose unit, they are responsible for providing multiple services, including transportation, protection, entertainment, and public health and welfare services.

To the contrary, special-purpose units are created to perform a single service or combination of related services. Examples include library, park and recreation, fire

protection and even school districts whose primary service is to provide education. Of our 6,918 units of government, special-purpose districts make up 3,204.

In most cases, general-purpose units of government can provide the same services offered by special-purpose units. Does that make special-purpose government redundant, confusing and costly to taxpayers? Often, the answer is "yes." However, in some situations, that local-level unit can perform services more efficiently, with less cost and a closer relationship to the residents.

DRAGON FRUIT



Dragon fruit
originates in Central
and South America

It is called a fruit but is actually a cactus.



It is textured, scaly skin comes in pink or yellow, while it's flesh may be red or white with scattered, tiny, black seeds. The skin should **not** be eaten.

The claiming cactus plant can grow 15 to 20 feet high and can live for up to two decades.

It is also known as "pitaya" or "strawberry pear".

The Commodities-Marketing Team sponsors 6 \$300 grants to support urban agriculture's growth in Cook County. Special thanks to the grant selection volunteers Gerry Kopping, Ellen Phillips, Rick Johnson, Karen Biernacki, and Angie Carmen.

- 50 Acre Farm located in Evergreen Park, is a food production garden emphasizing seed to harvest and farm to table activities to provide hands on educational experiences for community youth and families. Farm community activities focus on soil to seed, harvest, and nutritious meal production.
 Grant funds will be used to purchase seed, soil, planters, garden trowels and materials to create raised beds.
- St James Community Farm located in Chicago's Bronzeville neighborhood, is a food production farm garden that annually produces over 10,000 pounds of fresh fruit, vegetables and herbs for the Bronzeville and neighboring communities on the near south side. Produce is also sold through community CSA, on site farm stand, while donating 50% to local community food pantries, schools, health clinics and aid organizations. Funds will be used to purchase seed packets, fertilizer, compost, seedlings for late summer/fall succession planting.
- Oak Forest Pollinator Garden, located in Oak Forest, is a community pollinator garden that was established in 2021 with over 100 pollinator plantings and is expanding in 2022. The garden looks to continue educating the citizens of Oak Forest and

 garden beds on open plots for neighboring
 senior citizens to garden in a safe space.
 Grant funds will be used to purchase
 vegetable plantings, fruit tree, mulch,
 garden hose, trowels and garden bed kits.
- Roots Community Garden, located in Palatine, is a community volunteer garden producing over 960 pounds of fresh produce through 400 hours of volunteer gardening in 2021. The garden also serves to provide a space to offer children's activities and community events, including growing, meal planning, and cooking with fresh vegetables, among other programs. Funds will be used to purchase vegetable plantings, gardening gloves and shovels for volunteers.

Test your soil pH, potassium, phosphorous, and other key elements to begin the soil improvement process.
