Farm Bureau Opposes Gas Tax Increase

Cook County Farm Bureau sent the following letter to Cook County Commissioners regarding the proposed gas tax, the funding mechanism for the Community Stabilization and Anti-Violence Package:

This purpose of this communications is to state Cook County Farm Bureau®'s opposition to Ordinances 16-2566, 16-2567, 16-2569, 16-2570, and 16-2571, the Community Stabilization and Anti-Violence Package.

While we applaud the goal of reducing violence, poverty, and unemployment, Cook County Farm Bureau policy #202 (Cook County Finance) states that government economic policies should be designed to encourage economic stability ... improve our competitive advantage. Additionally, Illinois Farm Bureau® policy #130 (Transportation-Highways) states that we support motor fuel taxes, licensing and registration fees as the basic means for funding highway transportation systems in Illinois at both state and local levels. Using gas tax funds for projects unrelated to roadway improvements is in direct opposition to Farm Bureau policy.

Further, the proposed Parenting to Prevent Violence Program states that the advisory committee shall administer a grant program for qualified 501(c)3 and 501(c)4 organizations. However, the ordinance amendment does not state the types of programs that the grants are intended to fund. Additionally, the funds from the proposed gas tax increase will also be used to fund the Cook County Community Policing Initiative; however, the ordinance is vague as to what the initiative is intended to do or its goals.

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Farm Bureau Opposes Expansion of County Agency's Authority

The Cook Co. Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Management is tasked with acquiring federal grant funds in addition to other roles.

Under Senate Bill 3076, department staff could be deputized with full police powers. Department staff would have the authority to investigate and mitigate threats of manmade disasters, protect the county's infrastructure, have access to law enforcement databases, protect the county's emergency assets and personnel. All powers that sworn police officers already have.

Cook County is home to 160 separate police forces, including the Sheriff's Department which is tasked with patrolling the entire county. Additionally, there are 134 municipal police forces plus the State Police, Forest Preserve Police, campus police, hospital police, Metra police, and Water District police.

Illinois is already home to 6,963 local governments, now is not the time to create an additional fiefdom.

Cook County Farm Bureau® is opposed to Senate Bill 3076 and is actively working against the expansion of the Department's authority.

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

The package also includes a job training initiative. The ordinance states that the Cook County Job Council is tasked with identifying highway and infrastructure projects in the County and may develop job training programs. Job training is better accomplished through the use of partnerships rather than the county creating jobs.

The final piece of the Community Stabilization and Anti-Violence Package is the creation of the Office for People with Disabilities. Again while this is a laudable goal but a separate office doesn't need to be created to provide information to the Board of Commissioners or to recommend policies. An existing staff member can serve in this role and accomplishing the goals of the ordinance.

While we applaud the goal of reducing violence, poverty, and unemployment Cook County Farm Bureau is opposed to the package.
