## Policy Successes at Annual Meeting

Farm Bureau delegates from throughout Illinois approved numerous policies submitted by Cook County Farm Bureau®, including policy to reduce and eliminate duplicative services, programs and burdensome regulations. A study for the Small Business Administration, a government body, found that regulations, in general, add \$10,585 in costs per employee.

Delegates also approved policy supporting the use of existing road repair funds for roadway improvements rather than new expressways and interstates. According to studies, 25 percent of the region's highways are in unacceptable ride condition.

Cook CFB's resolution creating minimal guidelines for farms operating a community supported agriculture (CSA) program was also approved by Farm Bureau delegates. The resolution supports farms operating a CSA to disclose to its shareholders whether or not products will

originate from a single farm or multiple farms. The resolution also supports farms offering a CSA to notify shareholders in the event of a product substitution. It's estimated that between 30,000 and 50,000 U.S. consumers belong to a CSA.

Farm Bureau delegates also took several steps to update and modernize the Farm Bureau's policy book.

# Let's Talk About the Ag on Your Plate

How do animals stay warm in the winter?

If you have pets, you know that animals add extra (temporary) fur for the winter and then shed it (all over your house) when the weather warms up. Farm animals are no different, they'll add fur to help insulate themselves against the winter chill. It's because of this long coat that you'll often see horses feeding or bedded down despite the chilly weather and even falling snow. Like snow on top of a well-insulated house,

Many dairy calves in the Midwest are housed in individual or small-group houses when they are young to help keep them from spreading illnesses, if one of them becomes ill. In the winter, the individual or small-group houses are bedded with straw. The straw is replaced throughout the winter to ensure that it remains fresh, clean, and dry.

unmelted snow on the back of a horse or cow indicates that the animal is warm on the inside.

Farmers provide animals with shelter. In the simplest form, shelter may consist of a three-sided building. Animals like horses and beef cows will primarily use this shelter during rainfall. The building will allow fresh, clean air to circulate, which helps keep the animals healthy.

In the Midwest, most dairy animals are kept indoors to protect them from the cold winters and from hot, unrelenting summers. Even these well insulated barns have large panels to allow in fresh air. In the summer, the panels will again be opened to allow air to circulate. Many farmers will use sprinklers and fans to further cool their animals in the summer heat.

Farmers are committed to ensuring the health of their animals. That commitment doesn't change when the weather gets cold.
